Ben Poarch is an award winning photographer and printmaker. Karma Reclusado is influenced by old movies and creates digital renderings of people with a touch of whimsy. Karma has also included an artwork inspired by the ongoing pandemic titled Nights of Abstract Adjustments.

She dove back into a world of art, creating award-winning works in a wide variety of media. There is obvious joy and whimsical beauty woven into every fiber of the impressive work titled Birds on a Cape which is a full size cape competed entirely out of folded paper, featuring birds in a contrasting color.

Maggie Skidmore is an award winning ceramic artist and 3D designer who teaches ceramics at a local school of arts. Her works are thought provoking and compelling, utilizing

complementary textures and colors to achieve intriguing results. Maggie's sculpture, <u>Tree Bones</u>, captures attention with its contrasting bone-like top and wooden trunk.

Neda Towfiq studied art and design in Italy. She is diligent in creating every day, seeing beauty and potential in the simplest items. This can be observed in the watercolor paintings Neda creates on delicate packing paper. Her vibrant paintings such as Praise allow the observer to feel a reflection of emotions.

Stephanie Alacon is a sculptor and glass blower who studied for a time in Sweden. Her works create tension and wonderment. There is definite a science fiction feel to many of Stephanie's works, especially the sculpture <u>Just a Thought</u>. This work is apprehensively beautiful, while feeling as though it may move at any moment.
